The cover photo was taken by Frank Dean. Dean, also known as an "eyewitness to history," had taken many photos all over Grand Junction. This 1914ish photo is a preservation of Dean's work and was discovered in his building's attic when it was torn down in 1962. Containing a few coincidences, like the train passing by and the cyclist pedaling in front, the main focus is the fountain.

The fountain was originally located at Fifth and Rood, which was right in front of Dean's building. Upon its first installation in 1911, it was meant to provide water for horses and small animals when they were passing by. However, it only stayed in place for 12 years. With more people traveling and coming to live in Grand Junction, the city needed to pave its roads, so the fountain was removed in 1923. What was thought to be lost for 80 years was actually turned into a memorial fountain for Elmer Schwalm, a former basketball coach at Colorado Mesa University. With a few renovations done to the fountain, it can now be viewed at Stocker Stadium between the Lincoln Park barn and athletic field.



Don't worry about not having a spot, there is still plenty of time to register for this event; for a discounted fee register before April 2nd. Online registration doesn't end till May 7th. The race itself will take place on May 9th and May 10th, 2025, in downtown Grand Junction. You have no need to feel left out; they have a spot for juniors (18U), a men's and women's open, a men's and women's open, a men's and women's master class (45+), and even single speed races.

A highlight of this event is the Filthy 40 Mountain bike race (formerly known as The Epic Rides 40 Grand). The Filthy 40 starts and finishes on Main St. and is basically every hard and difficult trail from the Lunch Loop and 3rd Flats/Bangs Canyon area in one shot. It's horrible. The fast guys complete in 4 hours, the old men in 7, and the rest are still probably out there wandering around.


Once upon a time in the beginning of time... there used to be a road that went from Monument Road, GJ to Fruita over the Redlands. It was called Broadway. Broadway made a series of left and right hand turns as it headed west to go around people's property lines. In the 1940's, a new road was built called Hwv 340. It connected portions of the old Broadway and new segments were created to straighten out the road. The designers of the bike path on 4th and 5th street's named the new Hwy 340, wait for it..., Broadway. But you can't have two Broadways so all the old Broadways South or West of the new Broadway were renamed to, wait for it..., South Broadway.

The other route I'm still trying to figure out is Kannah Creek/Purdv Mesa roads. For years I thought I understood it. I had ridden it multiple times and even looked at maps but when I rode it this week I discovered that, I knew nothing. I came home and did a deep dive into my Google maps to discover that Purdy Mesa Road is broken into 3 sections that are gapped by Divide Rd and Lands End Road. Kannah Creek is Lands End according to Hwy 50 but not according to the maps. Purdy Mesa Road becomes Kannah Creek Road on a straight section by the side of Grand Mesa. This family tree of roads has more ingrown branches than an Alabama family reunion.


Rotating twice around, he defines as "Liberty," which he can almost do. Almost.

Out on the border of Utah and Colorado lies an old rail bed where the old Denver Rio Grande train would run its routes. The Railroad went out of use in the late 1880's when the railroad company went into bankruptcy.

With the train tracks ripped up and the route being abandoned, it has now become a place of wonder with twists and turns that any experienced bike rider would love to pedal. Near the 1.0 mile marker post on the old US Highway 6 and 50 from the Utah/Colorado border is where you'll be able to get access to this secret ride.



The old rail bed still exists and heads north towards the Book Cliffs and then west towards Cisco, Utah. The moto guys have kept the weeds down and now it's perfect for side by side mtn. biking. The trail is rail-road grade (2-3%) so it's very flat. For every mile a train had to go, it had to go 5 extra miles to get there. They don't climb hills very well.



As you ride the trail, it will take you back in time. Keep your eyes on the landscape to discover how much earth was moved or added to keep the route flat. Any time there is an arroyo or creek crossing, look for the culverts that still exist made out of huge stones that form caves under the rail bed. How they got that big stone cut, moved, and placed is beyond me. We are talking about mysteries of The Pyramids stuff. Grand Junction wasn't even a town until 1881 and the tracks were underway a year before that.

The Denver Rio Grande Railroad was founded by General William Jackson Palmer. He was also founder of Colorado Springs and the namesake of The Palmer Divide, south of Denver on I25, (Monument Hill).
